

## MESSAGE FROM ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Passage: A Moving Experience is dedicated to our friend Fernando Lara and the thousands like him who have been denied a fair claim to asylum in Canada, and endured many injustices including the withdrawal of their human right to health care while in Canada.

The story of global migration has not been an easy one to tell and it cannot be told without first acknowledging that that this story takes place on the occupied lands of the Mississsaugas of the New Credit First Nations and Turtle Island.

At the heart of the story of migration, lies racism, white privilege, xenophobia, prejudice, classism, gender and sexual discrimination, and many intersecting forms of oppression. Although this may sound extreme to some, these persistent realities are both the cause of most of the world's migration, the root of the poor treatment of many newcomers, and the reason we allow our own government to remove all humanitarian aspects of our immigration system with barely a peep of dissent.

Passage is the result of three weeks of 70 children, youth and artists bravely delving into a heartfelt investigation of the difficulties that immigrants and refugees face in building a new home here in Toronto. This work could not have been done without confronting our own accountability in this system that perpetuates these oppressions.

Through the development of this play, as artists building trust amongst each other, we created a space in which transformative moments could happen and ground the critical analysis of this play. I am appreciative of all the knowledge and wisdom that was shared by our guides and artists, which called us to engage in deep listening, asking the right questions, and building safer spaces for these important dialogues that have furthered the evolution of our process for future peace camps and campers.

I am forever grateful to the young participants who shared their stories of arriving in Canada, their pain, and by extension the pain many of our communities face, as they grieve the loss of their homes, cultures and identities. I am also forever grateful to the children who had the courage to take on the stories with such commitment and empathy.

I feel deeply touched and strengthened by the stories of resistance, revolution and responsibility that emerged. Special gratitude goes out to Rosary Spence and Marie Gaudet for sharing the Anishwabe Creation Story and its powerful message about the four races and their responsibilities to care for the earth, water, air and fire.

Through art we have seen how we have so much to learn from each other and that our city and our world is strengthened by diversity and collaboration, as exemplified by the cultural fusion of our musical guests Gary Diggins, Marito Marques, and Pako Luviano.

For me, this experience has renewed my belief in the possibility of peaceful co-existence and my commitment to working in solidarity with all people who come to this city seeking understanding, justice and a place to call home.



## **DIRECTOR'S NOTES**

hen I was first offered the task of directing a play about migration, co -created by children, my first reaction was "I would love to!" My second was "Oh my gosh -- what did I just say yes to?" To call this theme "big" is an enormous understatement. Global migration is the phenomenon that has in large part created our present world. Millions and millions of people around the world reside in nations that are not their birthplaces, for a myriad of reasons. I knew immediately that this wasn't something we



could unearth fully, so the challenge was determining which subthemes of the topic to shine a light on through this piece. The answers came largely from the campers and what resonated most strongly with them during our period of exploration in Week One.

I never cease to be captured by the intelligence and honesty of children. They possess the incredible ability to tell the truth as they see it, unfettered by the filters that can so often bind adults. Often shy at first, once they move past their initial reservations, their forthrightness can truly illuminate. A process that began with a discussion about our Indigenous people and Canada's colonial past soon gave birth to a creative journey exploring the subthemes of language, identity, education, refugees, assimilation and the eternal question -- what and where is "home"?

Creating this show has been a challenging experience, but an enlightening one as well. Moments of joy have buoyed and invigorated the process. Moments of conflict have served as a mirror, asking each of us to question our assumptions and understanding of the world and each other. It has all been about each other. I cannot express my gratitude enough to everyone who has helped to bring Passage to the stage, particularly the Artist & Youth Guides, our wonderful directors, and the children who inspire me. I would name names, but there are too many and the list goes beyond those on the stage, in the office or even those here with us. Thank you all for your contributions and commitment. And thank YOU, our audience, for celebrating the efforts of our campers today. We wish you peace.

Director, Peace Camp 2013 Passage: A Moving Experience

### MESSAGE FROM THE MUSIC DIRECTOR

his is my fourth year as the M.D. at the Peace Theatre and I am constantly asked "why do it?" I don't work with kids EVER in my regular musical career and, in the past, have often been perplexed by them. I have a filthy Brooklyn mouth and asked if there was a budget for therapy for these kids if Peace Theatre were seriously thinking of bringing me in. But this place is a reminder of the genuineness and authenticity children bring with them when they walk into a room. Not just in



how they live, but perhaps as a reminder of how we should all live. Their abilities to embody a moment is the stuff all jazz musicians interested in expression would kill to have. So I take off July every year from touring and come here to be reminded of all the reasons children really are our future. I know that might sound trite or Hallmark card-ish, but the Children's Peace Theatre is such a strong reminder of just how true that sentiment is.

BUT — this year's theme has been nothing short of grueling. The depths of discussion and exploration surrounding Migration are unimaginable and led to extensive interaction and exposition of this nuanced and complex topic. Many strong personal feelings and agendas surfaced, right along with all the feelings associated with that kind of investment... it was interesting to watch the Artist Guides struggle and grow through the experience. But I think such discourse is healthy. And necessary. We're not all meant to agree. But are meant to live together, and for me—Migration speaks to that fact loudly — the idea that we're all on this spaceship earth together and HAVE to find ways to get along. The great struggle to live together when we're all so different.

So I entered into the task of composition this year with that in mind, and wanting to challenge the children with some more complex harmonic, rhythmic and melodic function than in previous years. This year's opening & closing songs feature a jazz chord progress applied in a few different world music forms that are very challenging, requiring the children to hear small harmonic movements from their peers — while hanging tightly to their own part... before moving themselves a few bars later. And early on — they were terrible. No kidding... just brutal in a way that I wondered if I had bitten off more than I could chew this year with my overly-ambitious plans. But they QUICKLY adapted, as children do. And by the end of the second week, as these little voices held their parts and memorized lines and navigated complex rhythms, I found myself beaming with pride. They have all risen to the occasion and I look forward to standing at my station on stage right, where I'm parked every year and watching these remarkable youngsters do what they do every year — amaze me with the depths of their spirits and their boundless potential.

A'ight... I'm out. Peace.
